

## THE IMPACT OF PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT ON CHILDREN'S EDUCATION BY UNKNOWN AUTHOR.

Parental involvement is one of the most important predictors of students' success. This report reviews the importance of family engagement from the early years all the way up to age 16.

The authors of this report, published as a seven-page online downloadable document, summarize the research of more than 25 others, to conclude that parental involvement in children's education has a profound and lasting impact. Specifically, the report concludes that in the early years, parental involvement has a "significant impact" on children's cognitive development and literacy as well as number skills. The report also states that parental involvement in a child's schooling between the ages of 7 and 16 is "more powerful than family background, size of family and level of parental education." Other critical findings reported in this article: Parental involvement has a significant effect on pupil achievement throughout the years of schooling; Educational failure is increased by lack of parental interest in schooling; Most parents believe that the responsibility for their child's education is shared between parents and the school; and in particular, a father's interest in a child's schooling is strongly linked to educational outcomes for the child.
